'PRO-CHOICE' = NO CHOICE

If Governor Spitzer's Extreme Abortion Bill (S.5829), the so-called "Reproductive Health & Privacy Protection Act" or RHAPP, becomes law, New York State could:

- **Force doctors** to perform abortions
- **Force hospitals, even Catholic hospitals,** to allow abortions
- **Force health insurance plans** to cover abortions
- **Force employers** to purchase abortion coverage



The right to abortion could trump everything – even your conscience.



The governor's bill would make abortion in New York State a "fundamental right", just like the right to free speech and the right to vote.

Regardless of future U.S. Supreme Court decisions, the bill would guarantee any woman in New York State an abortion, for whatever reason or no reason at all, at any time during her nine months of pregnancy. And any hint of objection could be labeled "discrimination" and dealt with accordingly.

Governor Spitzer's Extreme Abortion Bill could wipe out all the progress already made by pro-life advocates:

- The state's successful Prenatal Care Assistance Program for poor pregnant women could be forced to fund abortions, draining taxpayer dollars away from the care needed to produce healthy babies.
- The state's alternatives-to-abortion fund could be forced to cover abortions, decreasing the scarce dollars available to help mothers choose life for their infants.
- The state's civil rights laws protecting doctors and nurses who do not wish to be involved in abortion would be in serious jeopardy.
